



Fire Recovery Projects - BIZ

- Phoenix has 7 projects currently in contract with BIZ
 - MWAP08 \$843,154 Award Date 4/27/2021;
 - C2021518 Building and Planning \$677,755 Award Date 6/26/2021;
 - SR2302 (ARPA) Charlotte Ann Water District Transition Costs \$5,000,000 Award Date 8/6/2021;
 - L21004 (SPWF) Fire Water System Repairs and Maintenance \$88,597 Award Date 3/5/2021 (this is the bridge loan for the Cat B);
 - L24002 (SPWF) Phoenix Government and Public Safety Center \$3,500,000 Award Date 10/6/2023;
 - X22001 (SPWF) Almeda/Glendower Fire Water System Repairs \$174,824 Award Date 1/26/2022 (this one is to cover the match for FEMA for eligible expenses); and
 - Y23005 (WWF) Charlotte Ann WD Waterline Relocation \$2,205,000 Award Date 4/7/2023.
- Additional project from 2023 SB 5506
- And another project in 2024 SB 1530

Water System Repairs

- •L21004 (SPWF) Fire Water System Repairs and Maintenance \$88,597 Award Date 3/5/2021 (this is the bridge loan for the Cat B).
- •X22001 (SPWF) Almeda/Glendower Fire Water System Repairs \$174,824 Award Date 1/26/2022 (this one is to cover the match for FEMA for eligible expenses).
- •Funds used to replace damaged water meters, purchase auto-flushers to keep water system clean, and to cover other eventually FEMA reimbursable expenses.
- •Also provided funds to cover match for FEMA eligible expenses.


Reservoir

- SR2302 (ARPA) Charlotte Ann Water District Transition Costs \$5,000,000 Award Date 8/6/2021.
- Funds provided to assist in transition of CAWD to City of Phoenix.
- CAWD did not have its own water storage was previously provided by MWC.
- Construction of new 2.5 million gallon reservoir and transmission line to add needed storage capacity for expanded service area.
- Will also serve new development in PH-5 in the future.
- 60% design. Bids by end of summer. Construction to follow.



Waterline¹

- Y23005 (WWF) Charlotte Ann WD Waterline Relocation \$2,205,000 Award Date 4/7/2023.
- Combination loan and grant.
- Relocation of waterline within the Hwy 99 right of way for ODOT project.
- This waterline, and its relocation, became the responsibility of the City upon CAWD dissolution.
- Project underway anticipated completion May 2024.



Government and Public Safety Center (GaPSC)

- L24002 (SPWF) Phoenix Government and Public Safety Center \$3,500,000 Award Date 10/6/2023.
- \$13,600,00 HB 5006, \$2,534,000 HB 5202, \$319,322 FEMA.
- Loan funding used to cover project shortfall (~\$20 million total)
- Project to replace functionally obsolete facilities for city hall, police station, and fire station.
- Fire station partially destroyed by Almeda Fire.
- No fire station in Phoenix since September 2020.
- Joint facility on property City already owned increased efficiency and reduced cost.



- Open House Tours: Explore the facilities and get an insider's look at the infrastructure designed to serve our community better.


Funded in 2023 SB 5506

- Industrial Improvements, South Valley Employment Center \$4,500,000
- Moving forward in spring 2025 lottery revenue
- Will provide infrastructure into a 75-acre tract of land for employment development. First phase of a larger employment area ~400 acres in Phoenix and Medford.



Funded in 2024 SB 1530

- Installation of approximately 1,300 feet of sewer line and 800 feet of water main to service vacant property. \$1,650,000
- 88 units of affordable housing funded through LIFT. Could provide for an additional 250 units of housing.
- One of two projects in Phoenix receiving approval for LIFT funds totaling \$28.8 million.



Fire Recovery Staff Capacity

- MWAP08 \$843,154 Award Date 4/27/2021.
- C2021518 Building and Planning \$677,755 Award Date 6/26/2021.
- Municipal Wildfire Assistance Program (MWAP) started in January, 2021, shortly after the fire and has been critically important.
- MWAP has been increased and/or extended several times.
- Phoenix also received support for building/planning staff through HB 5006.
- Recovery to this extent would not have been possible without these funds.
- Increased complexity for permitting, land use planning, project development, project administration, budget/finance, human resources.

Fire Recovery Staff Capacity

- Long-range planning:
 - Amended UGB
 - Annexed over 600 acres
 - Development Code text amendments
 - CAWD integration
- Current Planning/Building:
 - Roughly 95% of detached single family homes and multiple-family dwelling units replaced since fire.
 - 4 new multiple family housing complexes in pipeline with 233 units total (over 500 people)
 - Phoodery, Garrison's Home, Blackbird, Starbucks, Dollar General, Golf Garage

Fire Recovery Staff Capacity

• Project Development / Project Administration

Major Grant Awards - Total \$35,594,691

\$250,000 provided through Oregon Department of Administrative Services for immediate fire recovery needs not otherwise funded.

\$25,000 from Rogue Credit Union for preliminary design of the Phoenix Government and Public Safety Center (GaPSC).

\$13,600,00 provided through Oregon House Bill 5006 for construction of the GaPSC.

\$518,860 from State of Oregon for Wildfire Distribution (intended to offset lost property tax revenue from the fire).

\$250,000 from Rogue Valley Metropolitan Organization for transportation system repairs/enhancements.

\$677,755 provided through Oregon House Bill 5006 for additional Building and Planning Staff.

\$5,000,000 provided through Oregon HB 5006 for the dissolution of the Charlotte Ann Water District (funds used to construct water reservoir and transmission line).

\$843,154 provided through the Municipal Wildfire Assistance Program (MWAP) for additional staff capacity.

\$750,000 provided through Business Oregon Water/Wastewater Fund grant for Hwy 99 waterline relocation.

\$2,534,000 provided through Oregon House Bill 5202 for the GaPSC.

\$895,000 received from FEMA Public Assistance to replace damaged City infrastructure and property.

\$75,000 in private and corporate donations for reconstruction of Blue Heron Park.

\$319,322 received from FEMA for alternate project (generator) to replace destroyed portion of fire station.

\$247,600 from Oregon State Fire Marshall for hazard fuel reduction project and equipment.

\$4,500,000 provided through Oregon Senate Bill 5506 to develop infrastructure into the South Valley Employment Center (economic development/recovery).

\$3,459,000 PIER (Planning Infrastructure and Economic Revitalization) funds for new parking lot, stormwater, and sidewalk infrastructure downtown.

\$1,650,000 SB1530 for water and sewer infrastructure Grove/Fern Valley

Other Grant Awards Coordinated with Phoenix – Total \$32,000,000

\$28,800,000 of Local Innovation Fast Track (LIFT) funds provided to two affordable housing projects in Phoenix.

\$3,200,000 provided through Oregon House Bill 5006 to City of Ashland for Talent-Ashland-Phoenix (TAP) water system improvements.
